

Eilu v'Eilu



Just over two thousand years ago, there were two great schools of Rabbinic thought. One, the more liberal and lenient, was led by Rabbi Hillel. You may recognize that name since modern-day campus Jewish communities have

organized using his name for over 100 years. For the first decade of my professional life, I was a Hillel Rabbi.

The more traditionalist school of interpretation was led by Rabbi Shammai. He was interested in preserving older practices and was often resistant to innovations and changes.

The Talmud lists dozens of debates between these two powerhouses of ancient Judaism. While the Talmud loves debates, it is also interested in outcomes. Judaism is, after all, a religion of action. "What are we supposed to do?" is a guiding concern.

Nearly every time that Rabbi Hillel and Rabbi Shammai are mentioned, Rabbi Hillel's positions and practices are the ones that are endorsed.

It might be easy to conclude that Judaism will always take the more "open" approach, favoring it to competing stricter interpretations.

That is why the Talmud tells a more nuanced story about one debate between Hillel and Shammai. That debate went on for years without any resolution. It lasted so long that a "Heavenly Voice" finally proclaimed that "both these and those are the words of the living God." signifying that even opposing viewpoints can be considered valid interpretations of Jewish tradition.

If you want to look up this section in the Talmud, see Tractate Eruvin, page 13b. Most references to this part of the Talmud also include the Hebrew phrase *Eilu v'Eilu*, which translates as "both these and those."

Eilu v'Eilu has become a way in Jewish shorthand to indicate the value of considering diverse viewpoints. This is true even when the issues under discussion are seriously contentious. This is true even when a position will ultimately be endorsed. Our tradition has valued the conversation, and has made it a point from time immemorial to record both prevailing opinions as well as those which are ultimately dismissed.

This coming month will feature celebrations of Purim and our annual Jewish Festival. We have been planning these events for months and I am so grateful to all who have contributed their resources and time to making them a success. This coming month, Rabbi Hertz and I are also launching a series of conversations on issues facing us and society. We are calling these gatherings *Eilu v'Eilu*. We are doing this because we feel that it is important for people to hear from one another. Through sharing our lives and our perspectives, maybe there will be agreement. Or, as sometimes happens, we might just "agree to disagree."

During these, we will discuss Immigration, LGBTQ+ Inclusion, and "What's Going On In Washington?" For each issue, we want to sit together in community as we share, ponder, and listen to one another.

Similar to the Israel Chats that I convened last summer, these meetings will be open for sign-up with a limited number of spaces. Should we need to have a few groups for each topic, we will. The *Eilu v'Eilu* story of old parallels what has made Temple Emanuel such a strong presence for more than a century. Our connections to one another, and our ability to speak to and learn from one another, is just one more reflection of how "both these and those are the words of the living God."

The Mitzvot of Purim: Bringing Joy and Connection



Purim is one of the most joyous holidays on the Jewish calendar, a time of celebration, community, and gratitude. Beyond the costumes and festive meals, Purim is deeply rooted in

mitzvot—sacred obligations that help us connect to one another and to God. As we prepare for this holiday, let's reflect on the four central mitzvot of Purim and how they bring meaning to our celebration.

1. Megillat Esther - Hearing the Story

On Purim, we are commanded to hear the reading of the Megillah (the Book of Esther) both at night and during the day. The story of Esther and Mordechai reminds us of the power of courage, faith, and standing up against injustice. When we listen to the Megillah, we become active participants in our history, remembering how the Jewish people overcame adversity and celebrating the miracles of survival and redemption.

2. Mishloach Manot - Giving Gifts of Food

Purim is a holiday of connection and community, and one way we strengthen our bonds with one another is by exchanging gifts of food. The mitzvah of mishloach manot (sending portions) involves giving at least two different types of ready-to-eat food or drink to at least one person. This tradition fosters friendship and ensures that everyone has something festive to enjoy on Purim.

3. Matanot La'evyonim - Supporting Those in Need

Tzedakah is always important, but on Purim, it takes on special significance. The mitzvah of matanot la'evyonim (gifts to the poor) encourages us to provide for those in need so they, too, can celebrate the Purim holiday with dignity and joy. We are required to give to at least two individuals or contribute to organizations that distribute funds to those in need on Purim day. In this way, our joy is shared and extended to the entire community.

4. Seudat Purim - The Festive Meal

The joy of Purim culminates in a celebratory feast, a seudah. This meal is filled with delicious food, lively conversation, and gratitude for our blessings. Traditionally, the feast includes wine or grape juice, symbolizing the hidden miracles of Purim, and reminds us to approach life with gratitude and joy.

Purim is a holiday of laughter and lightheartedness, but its mitzvot come to remind us of our deeper responsibilities—celebrating our history, strengthening our community, caring for those in need, and embracing the joy that comes from connection. As we fulfill these mitzvot, may our celebrations be meaningful, our joy abundant, and our sense of unity stronger than ever.

Purim Carnival

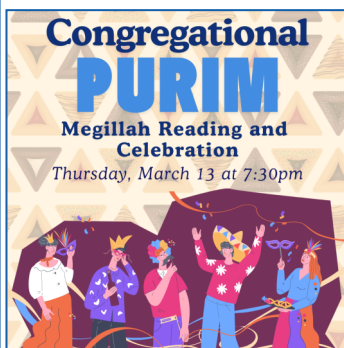

It's Festival time! As I'm sure you know, Temple Emanuel's annual Jewish Festival will take place on Sunday, March 23, from 11am to 5pm. That's only three weeks away! The Festival is the Temple's largest fundraiser, and it's a lot of fun as well.

I know what you're wondering. You want to know what you can do to help make the Jewish Festival as successful and fun as possible, right? Well, I'm glad you asked! First and foremost, you can sign up as a volunteer. Last year, my volunteer "job" was to walk around selling tickets, which was good fun. This year, I'm going back to the job I had at the first Festival in 2007: I'm going to be a greeter at the Jefferson Road entrance. I'll tell people where to find food and other attractions, where to buy tickets, and so on. My 17-year-old son Meyer will be inside, serving falafel.

What volunteer opportunities remain? A lot of them! As I write this, the Festival co-chairs, Stacey Papier and Jodi Kolada, are still looking for people to help in the Kid Zone (face paint not required); to bus tables and work in the kitchen; to answer questions about Temple membership; to help with parking; and to work in the Education area and teach our guests about Judaism and Israel.

They need more people to serve food and drinks: cold beverages, baked goods, deli sandwiches, egg creams, matzah ball soup.

You say you can't make it on Sunday the 23rd? Don't worry! We've got you covered, because we need a few more people to help set things up on Saturday the 22nd.

To sign up as a volunteer, go to the Festival website, www.gsojfest.org, and follow the links. You'll see what's still available, and I'm sure you'll find something fun to do.

You can also use the Festival website to...

- ✧ Buy raffle tickets. It's a 50-50 raffle, so the grand prize is half the total sales of raffle tickets, up to the legal maximum of \$5,000. There are 2nd and 3rd prizes as well, and if sales are particularly strong, we may add more prizes. I've bought my raffle tickets, and I hope you will as well... even though you'll reduce my chances of winning.
- ✧ Pre-order food. You can order frozen knishes, frozen kugel, and other items, which you can pick up on the day of the Festival.
- ✧ Support the Festival by becoming a Friend, Patron, or Sponsor. You can be a Friend for as little as \$100, a Patron for as little as \$250, and your company can be a Sponsor for as little as \$500.
- ✧ Check out the names and logos of the Festival's many supporters, including our Premier Sponsors, Our State magazine and Flow Lexus of Greensboro.

There is one more thing you can do to help the Festival be an even bigger success than it was last year. Show up, have fun, eat some food, and buy some stuff. As in previous years, there will be a shuk inside and outside of the Temple, with vendors selling arts and crafts and other items.

Social Action News

This is the month SAC has been waiting for! We kick off our Kavanah project on March 21 when Lylan Wingfield, Chief Program Officer at Kellin Foundation, will speak at our Shabbat service. But what is Kellin Foundation? To learn more, we spoke with one of its co-founders, Dr. Kelly Graves.

Graves states the idea for the Kellin Foundation came from conversations in 2008 about a desire to do things differently to support mental health across Guilford County. Sparked by a program run with Lindy Beauregard called CRI (Child Response Program) that worked with children and families impacted by stress and violence, they wanted to find a way to respond quickly and efficiently to their clients' needs. They first considered partnering with a non-profit, but Beauregard suggested starting a non-profit themselves to grow their legacy of support across the community. Graves thought this would be the CRI, but Beauregard told her to "think bigger" to allow room for growth. Beauregard suggested the non-profit be named Kellin, which combines Kelly and Lindy's first names. A few months later, Lindy died from stage 4 cancer, yet her legacy lives on.

Says Graves of beginning the journey to nonprofit, "If CRI was the only program we ever had out there, great, but if not, there would be space to grow. And grow would be an understatement of how this organization has evolved." Established as a 5013C nonprofit in 2013, Kellin opened its first physical location in a 900-square-foot building in 2016. Two years later, they became one of only two partners in the state invited to be part of the National Child Traumatic Stress Network, which recognizes centers of excellence in mental health. In 2020 Kellin was named Guilford County's Non-profit of the Year; Graves states it was particularly meaningful to be recognized that year since Covid challenged so many people and systems. In 2022, Mental Health Greensboro approached Kellin to come under their wing, thus growing Kellin's staff and reach in the community. The need for services is great; currently Kellin reaches 12,000 per year, and yet still has a waitlist of about 100 people. Thanks to grants and donations, 99% of the services are provided for free.

Kellin's focus is on understanding how stress affects people on a biological level, so every decision Kellin makes, from creating calming spaces to developing programming, is developed through the lens of reducing stress. And working under the belief that if one person in a family is struggling, that impacts the entire family, Kellin offers services for all ages. States Graves, 9 out of 10 people who access services have trauma

history, but most services don't integrate that information.

Their idea to provide quick and efficient support focuses on coordinating services in the most accessible way possible, because individuals who come to Kellin have many needs. Imagine "Sally," a single mother of multiple children. She needs mental health support, food support, and also childcare so she can go to work. Her children may need support as well. And Sally doesn't have a car, making it difficult to follow up on referrals located at multiple offices throughout the city.

When Lindley Park Baptist Church decided to dissolve in 2023, they wanted to make an intentional decision on what to do with their building. Kellin presented a model of a Hope Hub and was selected to be gifted the building. The 35,000 square foot Hope Hub will amplify what makes Kellin unique. Intended to provide earlier and easier access to mental health and substance use services, the Hope Hub will also provide access to services by non-profit partners. By co-locating multiple services under one roof, individuals in need can just walk down the hall rather than drive around town to access support.

What comes next? Kellin will join us at the Jewish Festival for hands-on activities on mental wellness and calming techniques. Throughout the upcoming year there will be both educational and volunteer opportunities for all congregants.

Meeting: The next IAHI (Interfaith Affordable Housing Initiative) meeting will be at Westminster Presbyterian Church on March 10th at noon. Bob Powell and Scott Neely will present building projects that the organization can support.

Action: The final Emergency Aid cooking/dinner serving dates at West Market UMC are both in March, on 3/9 and 3/30. 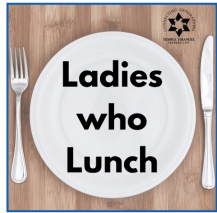

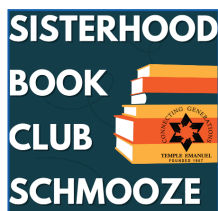

We had fabulous attendance, beautiful classical guitar music and a delicious brunch, including mimosas!

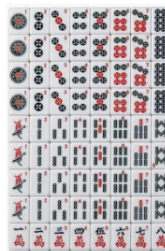
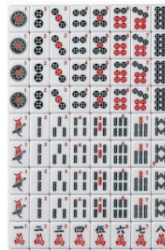
