Shoshana Dweck



The first Shabbat of this month is Shabbat Starts
Here. We will be at Temple's Historic Campus on Greene Street. Our services that night will be shorter than usual which will allow us a longer time over dinner to hear from

our special guest, Shoshana Dweck. Be sure to make your reservations to be with us that evening.

I first met Shoshana nearly 40 years ago when we were undergraduates at Tufts University. In fact, I had been President of Tufts Hillel and handed the gavel to her as I set off to study at Tel Aviv University for the spring semester of 1987.

Shoshana and her family have been leaders in the Jewish community, and specifically in Reform Judaism, for generations. Her path brought her to Greensboro many times over the years because her kids attended the former American Hebrew Academy.

We are so honored that she is returning this time as part of a series of Shabbat programming on December 6th and 7th.

Shoshana Dweck is a leader of WRJ (Women of Reform Judaism) which is our movement's national umbrella organization for Temple Sisterhoods. She is also deeply committed to Israel exemplified through her work with ARZA, the Association of Reform Zionists of America. If you consider yourself a Zionist, if you have strong commitments and/or questions about Reform Judaism's connections to Zionism and to the modern state of Israel, you will want to attend her sessions.

You can find more details in this bulletin as well as in other Temple communications. Here are the quick highlights:

- Friday, December 6, 6:30pm - note that we will be at our Historic Campus on Greene Street

Our topic will be Zionism, the work of ARZA, and specifically our role in the World Zionist Organization Elections which will take place in the spring of 2025. There will not be a sermon during services. Instead, we will have this extended conversation with Shoshana over dinner. There is a modest charge for dinner; your advance reservation is greatly appreciated.

Chevra Torah on Shabbat morning, Saturday, December 7 will take place from 9-10:30am

Shoshana will be our guest teacher and will be discussing the impact of war on women's issues, especially looking at the impact of October 7th. Even if you have never been to Chevra Torah, you should come for this special session of Torah study.

- Saturday, December 7, at 11:45am

Shoshana will lead a conversation about Reform Judaism in Israel. During this session, Temple will stream the weekly Israel Movement of Reform Judaism's Havdalah live from Israel. There will be a light, no-cost brunch for attendees.

A note about the hostages being held by Hamas terrorists and their collaborators in Gaza:

We have just passed the one-year mark since the hostage-for-terrorist-prisoner exchanges took place between Israel and Hamas. 105 civilian hostages, mostly Israeli, were part of this negotiated deal. I hope that by the time that this bulletin article is printed, the remaining 101 hostages are out of captivity, alive, and back where they belong, so that they and their families can take their next steps and heal. Sadly, now that over 420 days have passed since October 7th, we are approaching the 444-day mark. Some will remember how that was the number of days that American embassy staff in Tehran, Iran were held against their will following the revolution there in 1979.

I truly hope that well before we gather to light candles for Hanukkah at the end of this month that we will mark their return to freedom and to light.

Hanukkah will be at the end of the month. There will be many reasons for us to be at the vanguard of bringing more light to a world sorely in need of it.

Michal and I, together with everyone at Temple, send our blessings for a Hanukkah filled with peace, health, and freedom - for us, for our people, and for all people.

I Never Saw Another Butterfly

Temple Emanuel Member Shares the Story of Children of the Holocaust

Over 15,000 children passed through the gates of Terezin, a concentration camp 60 miles north of Prague. Fewer than 100 survived. *I Never Saw Another Butterfly* tells the story of the children who perished and those who survived.

Award winning Studio 1 Theatre in Burlington, North Carolina, brings this powerful and timely play to the stage January 16 - 19, 2025.

It has been the mission of 17-year-old Gracie Cohen, a member of Temple Emanuel, to tell the story of the children of the Holocaust, especially in her Alamance County community where there are very few Jewish families.

"Ever since I played the role of Raya Englanderova at Temple Emanuel when I was 12 years old, I wanted to bring this tragic yet hopeful story to a larger audience. It's important to me, especially during this time of

increased antisemitism, that everyone knows our history, so it won't be repeated."

From behind the barbed wire fences, teachers and students at Terezin showed defiance by learning when it was forbidden, by drawing pictures and writing poems of life as well as death. Their artistic creations show us inside their journey to survive.

Courtney Doi with the N.C. Council on the Holocaust, who had family members in Terezin, is contributing to this production by providing artifacts and bios of North Carolina Holocaust survivors.

Hanukkah Miracles & Light



Every week, I have the opportunity to be a part of t'filah with our Kesher students, both on Sundays and Tuesdays. This time is one of the many highlights of my week! I am always moved by the joy our Kesher students express as they sing and pray together. The

community and connections they are making are palpable. They are building a deep understanding of how prayer can have meaning in their lives today.

Over these last couple weeks, we have been thinking about how Hanukkah and the story of the Maccabees is richly connected to our prayer of freedom, *Mi Chamocha*. Hanukkah is a story about the Maccabees and a military victory against the ancient Greeks. The initials "Maccabee" in Hebrew are actually an acronym for this prayer. The letters stand for *Mi Chamocha ba'Eilim Adonai* which translates to "Who is like You, God, among all the others." The miracle of the Maccabees is there, if we look for it, every time we consider the miracle of the Exodus.

"Sometimes miracles aren't as spectacular as the parting of the Sea of Reeds," explains our Reform Movement's youth prayer book, Mishkan T'fillah for Youth. "Miracles can be found all around us, in moments like the birth of a child, or in the wonder of first learning to read. Nature is full of miracles as well, like the intricate crystals in a snowflake or a rainbow in the sky."

It is hard sometimes to think of miracles when there is so much that challenges our world. And, yet, this ability to look for the good, to look for the miracles around us can be an antidote to all that feels hard, sad, and out of control.

What are some everyday miracles, large or small, that you have experienced? Where can you look for these everyday miracles? How might we share these experiences with those we love and with our Temple Emanuel and larger Jewish and world communities?

When I asked our Kesher students about the everyday miracles they have experienced, they shared their miracles including families who love them for who they are, leaders who are working towards peace in the world, friends who make them feel seen, pets, clothes and food and shelter. Our youth understand the miracles of everyday lives.

And gathering together to celebrate all that is good and light-giving is a miracle too! This Hanukkah, there are many ways we can gather at Temple Emanuel. Just a few that I am very excited about include our Temple Emanuel and Children's Museum of Greensboro collaborative Hanukkah celebration on December 8, our Kesher Family celebration on December 15, and our Crafts, Cocktails and Convo Hanukkah event for women sponsored by Sisterhood on December 17!

We each bring a spark of light with us and, together, that light is bright. We need you to help light our community bright this Hanukkah season!

Social Action News

Social Justice is a core value in Judaism, and "Justice, justice, you shall pursue" is a command that we hold dear. The newlyenergized Social Action Committee (SAC) has been working for almost a year to create an active and responsive committee to engage the congregation. As we considered how to organize ourselves, we reviewed recommendations from the Religious Action Center for Reform Judaism (RAC), examined previous Temple Emanual initiatives, and also looked at activities that have been ongoing. Ultimately, we organized the committee under three Jewish Values: Kavanah (intention), Kehillah (connections), and Nedivut (be generous.)

Kavanah/Intention (mindfulness of our work) -Bringing full attention to our thoughts, actions, and words increases the fullness with which we live. Mindfulness helps us not only to bring ourselves to prayer; it helps us live deeply. For SAC, Kavanah will function as a long-term focus project, providing multiple opportunities to get the congregation (you!) involved in enduring and impactful ways. After researching several possibilities, we are pleased to announce that we will be partnering with Kellin Foundation over the next 12 months. The Kellin Foundation's mission is to strengthen resilience among children, families, and adults through trauma-informed behavioral health services aimed at supporting mental and emotional well -being. It does this by providing free services to about 12,000 individuals each year, extending behavioral health services to those who otherwise lack access to this essential care. We are currently meeting with Kellin Foundation for planning and can't wait to present our project to the congregation!

Kehillah/Connections (commitment to community) - According to Jewish tradition, human beings can only fulfill themselves fully in relationship with others. Community is the focus of our relationships, and building and sustaining communities is critical to human fulfillment. As Jews, we strive to create communities that manifest justice, holiness, and peace. This aspect of SAC is how we connect with you, and ultimately also with the greater Jewish community as well as the Greensboro community. We want SAC to provide a way for everyone to get involved. We will be surveying the congregation to learn about interests and skills, and we plan to use this information as we develop actions and activities, as well as to foster leadership for our initiatives.

Nedivut/Be Generous - We must give not out of obligation, but with a willing heart. Our tradition calls this a generosity of the heart, and tells us that it is our nature to be open-hearted. Caring comes easily when our hearts are open. SAC is not just one Kavanah project! There are several ongoing and cyclic activities and events that we support. Some examples include collections for the JFS foodbank, collections and apartment set-up for new immigrants, Aviv, and One for the Road bags.



Shoshana will be joining us for three events to help spark important discussions about Israel, women's issues, and the upcoming World Zionist Organization elections.

About Shoshana

Shoshana Dweck is a Women of Reform Judaism (WRJ) Executive Committee Member-at-Large, co-chair of ARZENU (the International Federation of Reform, Progressive, Religious and Liberal Zionists) and serves on the Executive Board of the URJ. A second-generation activist in the worlds of WRJ and Reform Zionism, Shoshana is on the Executive of the Jewish Agency and the Expanded Executive of the World Zionist Organization and has been vice president of ARZA and vice chair of the United Israel Appeal. She also has served on the Tribunal of the American Zionist Movement (AZM), where she is currently a board member and has roles with the Anti-Defamation League (ADL).

A recovering lawyer and engineer, she started her WRJ leadership journey as sisterhood president of Temple Shaaray Tefila in Bedford Corners, New York, where she now serves on the Temple Board, and on her District Board. When serving as WRJ's Social Justice Vice President, Shoshana helped to launch "WRJ says STOP: an Initiative against Sexual Harassment and Assault." Shoshana is a former local Federation President and past-chair of the New York Says Thank You Foundation and its "Stars of HOPE" healing arts work supporting individuals and communities around the world impacted by mass tragedies. She is the proud mother of three sons, one cat, and two grandkitties.


New Year's Hanukkah Party Tuesday, December 31 | 6:00pm

Early Bird pricing is \$10 until January 3. After January 3, the price is \$15 for Temple members. Tickets for non Temple members is \$20.


